# NONVERBAL COMMUNICATION

#### Overview

This course provides an in-depth study of nonverbal communication. Because CMST 2010 or an equivalent is a prerequisite for the class, students should already understand the communication process and have some familiarity with nonverbal messages and their many forms and functions. This course will examine nonverbal communication in two ways. The first will be to examine theories and research about the codes and communicative functions of nonverbal behaviors. This will provide a cognitive understanding of the importance, pervasiveness, and effect of nonverbal communication, as well as the role it plays in the overall communication process.

The second way that we will examine nonverbal communication is to experience actively how individuals use it, and discover what happens when nonverbal rules are violated. We will explore nonverbal abilities and expectations to understand the range of nonverbal communication. This will provide students with a subjective awareness of their own and others' nonverbal messages.

#### **Objectives**

- 1. The primary objective of this class is to enhance the student's ability to observe, interpret, and analyze the role of nonverbal behaviors and messages.
- 2. Students will be able to conduct original research related to nonverbal communication.
- 3. Students will be able to make oral presentations about elements of nonverbal communication.
- 4. Students will be able to make oral presentations summarizing their own observations about an element of nonverbal communication.
- 5. Students will be able to write a research paper summarizing previous research as well as their own observations about an element of nonverbal communication.

#### **Communication across the Curriculum**

This is a certified Communication-Intensive (C-I) course which meets all of the requirements set forth by LSU's Communication across the Curriculum program, including

- instruction and assignments emphasizing informal and formal [mode 1] and [mode 2];
- teaching of discipline-specific communication techniques;
- use of draft-feedback-revision process for learning;

- practice of ethical and professional work standards;
- 40% of the course grade rooted in communication-based work; and
- a student/faculty ratio no greater than 35:1.

# Exams - 40% of the final grade

- Chapter Quizzes 30% of final grade. Beginning with Chapter 3 and each additional day for which a chapter is assigned, students will take two in-class quizzes. The first will be based on the student's reading and understanding of the material. After the quiz, students will form groups and re-take the quiz. Both grades will be entered into the student's gradebook on Moodle. At the end of the session, the grade for chapter quizzes will be based on the 10 best individual grades (20% of the final grade) and the 10 best group grades (10% of the final grade).
- **Final Exam** 10% of the final grade

#### **Research Paper** – 35% of final grade

You will write an 8-10 page paper about some narrow aspect of nonverbal communication. Your paper will include

- A summary of two journal articles and information from the textbook plus the Reference List (use additional sources as needed; they must be scholarly). This is Part I of the paper an is due around the middle of the term (10%).
- A description of observations you make this term (including a description of how you made them and conclusions you can draw from them) and a discussion. You will combine your revisions of Part I with this section to create your complete paper (25%)

Throughout the session, you will turn in additional sections of your paper as part of "Activities and Written Assignments." The complete paper is due at the end of the session (25%). Your paper must be submitted in hard copy on the due date; emailed versions are not permitted. Late papers will lose 10 points per calendar weekday.

## **Oral Presentations** – 10% of final grade

- Artifact Presentation You will give a presentation in which you show and explain an example of a concept or topic in the chapter (3-5 minutes). For this presentation, you will probably use PowerPoint.
- Paper Presentation You will make a presentation of your research paper to the class at the end of the semester; 4-6 minutes long.

# **Activities and Written Assignments** – 15% of final grade

Throughout the session, you will submit components of the paper: topic and thesis statement, sources, method for conducting observations, summary of an article, and reference list in the correct citation style (APA). Other assignments will include peer feedback, activities, and required writing or participation. The lowest two grades will be dropped.
