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COURSE DESCRIPTION

CMST 2064 Small Group Communication. (3) Aspects of group leadership; group discussion and the problems of communication in human relations

In this course, we will study how to work well in groups by focusing on its communication components: creating workable goals, the stages of group development, task and social maintenance roles, membership diversity, leadership, motivation, listening, conflict resolution, problem solving, critical thinking and argumentation, planning and conducting meetings, and issues of ethical behavior.

RESPONSIBLE GROUP PARTICIPATION

As most students are aware, group projects can be challenging. One of the biggest problems occurs when members do not put similar time and effort into the outcome. Some members are highly engaged, even to the point that they take over the process. Other members may slack off. For the group projects in this class, you will receive two grades: one for the whole group (weighted more heavily at 66.7%) and one that reflects individual effort (33.3%). If your group includes members whose participation does not meet expectations, you should engage in open communication by dealing with each other tactfully and directly, either individually or as a group. After your conversation, if participation has not improved sufficiently, you should bring the problem to my attention. Group members whose work is significantly sub-standard may be counseled, disciplined, and/or removed from the group (thereby receiving a "0" on the assignment).

ONLINE COURSEWORK

This is the first time I am teaching online and it is the first time CMST 2064 has been offered online here at LSU. If you have suggestions for improving the class, especially the online component, please feel free to share them with me. I have worked with the LSU Faculty Technology Center and the Online Learning Cohort to learn more about online teaching. Research on teaching suggests that students learn more in hybrid classes than they do in either fully online or fully in-person courses (this surprised me!). I also consulted with some undergraduates who have taken online courses at other universities – they did not like long video lectures or lectures that repeated material in the textbook. One said that her online class "made" her read the textbook, which she really liked (this also surprised me!).

We will use the online portion of the class to cover basic material and the in-person component of the class to practice skills important for small group communication. Written assignments will ask you to draw connections between theory and practice.

MAJOR ASSIGNMENTS AND ACTIVITIES

1. Exams (50% of final grade)

Exams 1 & 2 will be objective tests of your comprehension of material primarily from the textbook. The textbook includes a number of tools for helping you with the material including the Chapter Outline at the beginning of each chapter and the Summary Study Guide at the end of each chapter. The Final Exam will be an open book, online essay that you complete during the exam window.

2. In-class Attendance and Participation (10%)

For the days we meet in person, attendance and engagement are important. In addition to participating in exercises and activities, you will observe and evaluate other groups doing their problem-solving

discussions and group presentations. DO NOT use technology or engage in other activities during class time for personal reasons (unrelated to the class). Cell phones and other devices should be silent and not disruptive. For most in-class activities, you will receive full credit (100%) if you are here and participate. Some in-class activities may be graded on a 0-100% scale.

3. Online Discussion and Participation (10%)

For online days, engagement and participation are important. Your work will be evaluated in two ways (each is 5% of the final grade).

For the first component (5%) you will receive full credit for completing 1-2 page written assignments fully and submitting them on Moodle by the posted deadlines. For example, you will write answers to questions over textbook material. Other assignments will be analyses in which you link concepts from the textbook to activities conducted in class or out-of-class, videos or movies you watch, and case studies in the textbook. You may participate in an online, asynchronous discussion with your group and make a contribution to a "voicethread."

For the second component (5%), on July 5, you will submit a portfolio that includes your best written work. You should select four assignments for which you did your best analyses of small group communication and wrote clearly and correctly. Your portfolio will be evaluated using the following criteria:

4. Group Work: Problem-Solving Discussion (15%)

For this assignment, you and several classmates will assume that you work for a large corporation, the 2064 Company. Because of your successful history with the company, you have been assigned by your manager to a group that includes employees from different divisions of the corporation. Your group will be tasked with making an important corporate decision based on research you conduct individually and as a group. As a final step in making your decision, you and your teammates will hold a problem-solving discussion *in class*. You and the group will be evaluated according to the quality of your group discussion (10%). Each individual member will be evaluated by other group members for their level of participation (5%).

5. Group Work: Group Presentation (15%)

For this assignment, you and your group will develop and deliver a presentation to the class on some topic; the topic will either be assigned or based on interests in the class. Your grade will be based on the quality of the presentation (10%) and your individual contribution to the group effort (5%).
