I. Course Description

We live in what has been described as the Age of Organizations, the Administrative State, and the Institutionalized Society. However it is described, there is broad recognition that organizations and institutions are key aspects of mass society. Among the most well-theorized of these organizational forms is bureaucracy, a formal arrangement that is both praised and derided in popular sentiment. This course will explore the meaning of bureaucracy and how it fits as a political-economic form into modern society.

Although this is not a seminar course, you are expected to attend all sessions and participate. Participation means engaging with the instructor and guest speakers and asking thoughtful questions.

The reading material is very important for this class. You must come to class prepared to answer questions about the readings.
